Here are excerpts from the memo:

**Re:** What last night meant

The 2013 election cycle is now behind us, and two undisputable facts emerged: it was a great year to run as a Democrat, and it was an even worse year to run as a Republican.

- **Virginia:** Virginians elected Governor-elect Terry McAuliffe and Lt. Governor-elect Ralph Northam, and once all votes are counted, we believe Democrats will have swept all three statewide offices for the first time since 1989. As of this morning, Democrats have picked up a net of two seats in the state House of Delegates, eliminating the GOP's veto-proof majority, with several other races undergoing canvasses.
- **New Jersey:** Senator Cory Booker was elected a few weeks ago by a double-digit margin over a Tea Party candidate who supported the government shutdown. Voters passed an increase in the minimum wage that Christie had vetoed, and maintained Democratic control of both houses of the state legislature – losing no seats in the Senate – despite a massive investment of resources by Republicans and the Governor on the other side.
- **New York:** Mayor-elect Bill DeBlasio won by a historic margin, becoming the first Democrat to win the seat since 1989.
- **Mayors:** Democrats saw big wins across the country, from St. Petersburg where the incumbent Republican was unseated to Charlotte, Boston, Houston and Atlanta where Democrats were elected and reelected by wide margins.
- **Florida:** Democrat Amanda Murphy won a special election for a state House seat in Pasco County that had been held by Republicans for nearly twenty years.

### **SO WHAT HAPPENED, AND WHAT DOES IT MEAN MOVING FORWARD?**

With yet another major election defeat, Republicans continue to [play the blame game](#), as they struggle to figure out why they keep losing.

## President Obama Voices Support for the Senate's Passage of ENDA

This week the Senate passed the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA) and the President voiced his support for the bill, urging the House to pass it as well.

ENDA makes it illegal to fire someone based on their sexual orientation or gender identity, and allows millions of Americans to not have to fear losing their jobs. The President released a statement saying supporting ENDA saying, "Just as no one in the United States can lose their job simply because of their race, gender, religion or a disability, no one should ever lose their job simply because of who they are or who they love."

To help Americans understand the importance of ENDA, White House Press Secretary Jay Carney released a video to explain the bill.



## In the States

- On Monday, State Senator Anna Tovar, State Senator Steve Farley and health care exchange enrollee, Sandy McNabb participated in a press call to discuss the benefits of Obamacare in Arizona. - On Thursday, the Georgia Democratic Party sent an email in support of State Senator Jason Carter's bid for Governor. This offers a "fresh start" for the state of Georgia to bring in a cohesive team, backing one candidate, ahead of the 2014 election. In the email, Democratic Party Chair of Georgia, DuBose Porter said, "Georgia has an opportunity for a fresh start, and now has fresh ideas for the future at the top of the ticket."

## President Obama Welcomes Stanley Cup Winners to the White House

On Monday, President Obama welcomed Stanley Cup winners, the Chicago Blackhawks, to the White House. It's the second time the team has visited, securing the Stanley Cup twice under President Obama's presidency. The President spoke highly of his hometown team saying, "Now, since I took office, we've hosted a lot of championship teams -- from Boston and New York; Pittsburgh and Miami," the President said. "But since I've been President, only one team has brought a world championship to my hometown of Chicago. And now the Blackhawks have done it twice."

The Blackhawks won the series in game 6 with a last minute goal during the final 76 seconds of the third period. The President made an appeal to the other professional teams in Chicago, saying he wished to see them in the White House as well. "To the Bulls, Bears, Cubs, White Sox -- I am term-limited, so you guys have got to get moving. I need to see you here soon. Championships belong in Chicago. So, to the Blackhawks, thank you for bringing it back home. Thanks for bringing the Stanley Cup."
